



Executive Reports

Diocesan President's Annual Report 2019 Rebecca McCarrell

London Diocese continues on their journey to celebrate 100 years in 2020. Many of the activities in the 2019 year were in support of this quest combined with Care for our Common Home (National theme) encompassing environmental concerns, Homelessness, and Loneliness (Provincial themes) and our own theme of Educate, Engage, and Empower.

Our membership is quite active in Social Justice issues and have been instrumental in support of Farmtown Canada's initiatives on Human Trafficking especially throughout the 400 highways in Ontario. Hundreds of our membership supported the demonstration in July.

Support of life at all stages remains a priority within our councils. Euthanasia Prevention Coalition, support for physicians and agencies who do not wish to be part of MAID, Hospices and different activities for the homeless, less fortunate and the lonely were upheld in every community.

Many of our parish council presidents fit into the recycled category and have more than 25 years of membership in the CWL. The majority of these women are between 65- and 74-years young with 12 who range in age from 75 - 84.

Many presidents acknowledge that succession planning remains the most difficult aspect of the position. Filling of all executive positions is problematic given the age of membership and the lack of new and younger members. Membership in general is on the decline and the lack of new and younger members is partially contributed to the change in the diocesan structure of Family of Parishes.

Over 18,000 pairs of socks were donated for the Out of the Cold campaign. These were distributed to the many agencies that support the homeless and less fortunate of London Diocese.

2019 was a year of transition, within our parishes, councils and communities. We look forward to celebrating 100 years in 2020.

Organization Standing Committee Report

Parishes Reporting: 65

Recruit Members and Maintain Membership

Advertising in church bulletin was cited as most successful method for recruiting new members, closely followed by personal invitation. Members who did not renew were given personal telephone call or invited to a meeting by email or snail mail. Members were recognized by presentation of service pins, and cards or announcements. Councils engaged new members by welcoming them at meeting, conversations and invitation. Online membership is now used by 75% of councils. Most commonly used reminder of dues is church bulletin followed up by phone calls.

Leadership Development

Participation in the League development days was 42%. Participation at diocesan convention was good where most councils sent multiple members. About 71% of councils had someone attend annual retreat days. A small amount, 28% of councils participated in leadership workshops. There were 23 members who attended provincial convention and 10 that attended national convention. Planning strategically sessions were held at our fall regionals where most councils participated. Thirteen councils reported having executive members on diocesan council, 7 councils regional and three have a member on provincial. Majority of councils reported no training has been offered in their council this past year specific to developing leadership skills. Majority of councils followed 90-minute meeting protocol, faith, fun and commitment. This year 60% of councils were aware of the Catholic Women's Leadership Foundation.

League Resource Material

The Canadian League magazine was cited as the most useful resource at the council level. Many are accessing the websites of different levels of the League to obtain handbooks, guides, prayers, policy & procedures and bylaw material. Service pins are used by 63% of the councils but other promotional material is seldom used.

Life Membership

London Diocese has 10 Life Members. Our Life Members are asked for guidance and to provide mentorship to a small percentage of councils. Life members are not utilized as much as they would like. Councils are not aware of the role of a Life Member or how they could use their wealth or knowledge.

Education and Health Standing Committee Report

Catholic Education

- (i) Catholic Schools and Catechesis: A high percentage (81%) have informed themselves about the quality of religious instruction in their parishes and have enquired about how they might support the program. A large number (87%) have become informed about religious instruction in schools and 73% have encouraged parents to participate in all areas of their children's school education. About half of the councils have investigated the needs of Catholic schools that could be met by the council. Needs identified were scholarships or bursaries (71%), sacramental/faith development (58%), school supplies (32%) and breakfast and lunch programs (29%). 63% or 40 of the 64 responses are aware of the family life programs in Catholic schools.
- (ii) **Rites of Christian Initiation:** The 64 responding councils reported a total of 88 participants in the RCIA program in their parishes.

Literacy and Continuing Education

About 1/3 (27%) of the councils responding had encouraged members to assist those who wish to improve their literacy skills. 63% replied that they had a current list of Catholic universities or colleges in London diocese. There seemed to be some confusion since 5% said there were no Catholic colleges/universities in the diocese-perhaps these thought it meant "municipality".

Scholarships and Bursaries

56% indicated they did not have a list of scholarships and bursaries available to be accessed for Catholic women to further their education although 59% said that their council provided a bursary or scholarship or funded another bursary/scholarship. Most councils replied "not applicable" to the varying recipients, although 76% provided bursaries to high school students. Specific comments dealt with support of students involved in parish service, Net ministries, funding of high school uniforms for students in need, support of parish seminarians and help through Guatemala Hope. 38% of the councils supported National

Bursary and Coady International with a total of \$1200.

Wellness and Sickness/Disease

Members indicated that they had signed petitions, attended sessions with Alex Schadenberg concerning euthanasia, listened to speakers about local hospices and financially supported these

hospices. A large number participated in 12 hours of Prayer for Palliative care in various ways. Some also indicated they had participated in the Mental Health Postcard campaign. Due to the way the actions were reported it was difficult to determine which resolutions the councils had acted on and the percentages for each. For the Mental Health Postcard Campaign 14% participated, although 25% supported the Canadian Mental Health Association. A small percentage 14% indicated that their members had donated blood through registering for the Partners for Life Program under the League's ID (catho11269).

Environment

With the emphasis on water 41% participated in the CWL Water Pledge Challenge Campaign and 16% celebrated United Nations World Water Day by reminding members not to use plastic water bottles and to bring reusable containers to meetings. Councils participated in the Postcard Campaign and educated members about Flushable Wipes. Some participated in the water pledge challenge. A total of 33% acted on Resolutions: 2004-Water Use in Canada, 2001-Water Quality in Canada, and 2005-Developing Countries and Water. Members took their own actions for Earth Day, both in their parish bulletins and at meetings, also encouraging reducing their use of hydro. Other issues were non-use of Styrofoam (70%), recycling (69%), composting (20%).

Genetics

Councils rated their knowledge of the advantages and disadvantages of technology to alter genes in light of Catholic teaching: 70% good, 22% fair and 11% very good.

Other

Concerns were indicated about learning more about the Opioid crisis, bioethics, Catholic universities, ways of assisting indigenous culture particularly with awareness of the poor quality of water in many of their communities. Council activities were very important such as: local charities assisting pregnant women and women battling substance abuse. An active role is played in homelessness through the Out of the Cold project and assistance to the St. Vincent de Paul Society. They support sacramental preparation and volunteer at the schools.

Spiritual Development Standing Committee Report

Spiritual Growth of Members

Members used a variety of resources for their spiritual growth. Many of these were "tried and true" programmes such as CWL Prays. Websites such as "Dynamic Catholic" and "Salt & Light" were also used. Members took advantage of parish programmes such as "Why Catholic?" and "Alpha" for their spiritual growth. Resources suggested in communiques from National were NOT used by more than 80% of the members.

Study of Catholic Teachings

There were no specific ways that councils studied Catholic teachings. Most were not familiar with a variety of material. Councils stayed with what was offered by their parish, Alpha programme, Why Catholic? To increase their knowledge of Catholicism.

Role of Women in the Church

A large percentage of councils (60%) did not promote an awareness of women's place in the church. However, the same percentage had leadership roles in their parish. These included the pastoral council, finance committee and liturgy committee.

Evangelization and Mission Assistance

Approximately half of the councils subscribed to Catholic Missions in Canada. All councils support some type of mission either monetarily or with goods.

Lay Ministries

Over 50% of council members participated in lay ministries or chaired a ministry in their parish. These included Eucharistic minister, lector, hospitality, sacristan, choir and decorating

Ecumenism and Interfaith Endeavours

Other than the World Day of Prayer, councils had very little interaction with other faiths. Fellowship of the Least Coin, the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity and WUCWO Day were not promoted by the majority of the councils (over 75%).

Recording Secretary

Recording Secretary Report

Parishes Reporting: 73

London Diocese has 94 CWL councils, and of those 73 responses were received for Recording Secretary using the electronic Annual Report Forms, that is 77%.

39 councils stated that they had both a Recording Secretary and a Corresponding Secretary; while 11 councils identified that the same person did both jobs. 1 council said that the position was vacant.

The question was asked who was completing the survey. 84% identified themselves as the Recording Secretary or both, while 8% said other. (Other was usually the president)

64% (47) were elected to the position, while 30% (22) were appointed to the position.

When asked how long they had been a CWL member, 45% (25) said that they had been a member for more than 25 years. 16% (9) had been a member for less than 5 years with the rest between members between 5 and 25 years.

64% (35) ladies stated that they had held this position before.

49% (27) stated that they were between the age of 65-74, 26% (14) between the age of 55-64, trending down to one person between 25-34 and none below that age.

The mean number of years holding position of Recording Secretary is 4.15 years.

The following questions were asked regarding meetings:

•	Do you take roll call	61% said yes
•	Do you bring minutes book to meeting	91% said yes
•	Do you take minutes at meeting	98% said yes
•	Send out minutes of previous meeting	87% said yes
•	I am a Signing officer	55% said yes
•	I assist president with annual report	61% said yes
•	Do you bring motion book to meetings	87% said yes
•	Don't have a motions book	23% stated this

When asked if they knew where Council Charter was located 82% knew where to find it.

87% of the ladies maintain a list of the executive with their contact information.

When asked if they received written reports from the executive, 41 5 said sometimes, while another 31% said yes and 12% said no, they did not receive executive reports.

The mean amount of years that councils keep minutes in the minutes book was 5.5 years before becoming archived.

77% of the parish council secretaries have the National Handbook for Secretaries, which is unchanged from 2018.

Following are some of the challenges faced by Recording Secretaries in 2019.

- Not all members have an email address/computer to send out minutes electronically; so small number of copies of minutes/agendas are printed out to bring to meeting.
- Doing minutes at trial online meeting was very difficult so we have returned to meeting together.
- Ensuring accuracy of minute taking send minutes in advance of the meeting and reviewing them at the meeting

Success stories

- We have become a more open council and are working with other groups in our parish and thus attracting new members.
- Learning to record the minutes and typing them on the computer and them learned to email them to my president. This gave me a lot of confidence in myself
- Addressed the challenge of being secretary and believe I was successful in doing this.

Recommendations

Encourage every council to have a Secretary Manual from National. It would be a great help to anyone who is new to the position.

Encourage every council to have a separate Motion Book to house all the motions made by the council.

Corresponding Secretary

Duties

• The responsibility of corresponding secretary, is to provide a list of all correspondence

Recommendations

- This year's annual survey indicated that many councils do no have an Administrative Assistant
- The survey indicated that 8% of the London Diocesan council's have an administrative assistant and 21% indicated that the position is done by both the recording secretary and corresponding
- The responsibility of sending out occasion cards, sympathy is done by 39% of the councils
- A copy of the CWL Personal Letter Writing Guide from our national office is in possession of 58%. This is an 11% increase from 2018. It is important that every council have one to assist them in writing letters, how to write and where to send. Councils can obtain a copy which is available via the web site.
- It was noted that the position of Administrative Assistant is still very new and many councils are not aware of the duties.
- An updated Manual for Recording and Administrative Assistant would be helpful for councils.

Serve in a Consultative Capacity

Although more than half of the past presidents attend meetings, less than half are called upon for advice on a regular basis. However, 90% indicate their president feels supported and encouraged by them for help.

Be Responsible for Archives and History

A little more than half indicate they are responsible for the archives in their councils and 50% keep the archives in a cupboard or filing cabinet at the church. A few keep them in the secretary's home and the parish office. Most councils keep photo albums and scrapbooks and half of the councils use banker boxes for storage. Only 22% use memory sticks. Less than half keep a copy of the annual reports indefinitely, but the majority keep their book of life indefinitely. A little more than half of councils keep the minutes of their executive meetings and general meetings indefinitely. The archives are reviewed as needed by 91% of the councils. Slightly more than half keep a history book and a large number keep labelled photo albums.

Facilitate the Study and Implementation of the Constitution & Bylaws 2013 (revised)

Almost all councils have a copy of the Constitution & Bylaws however, 45% of them rarely if ever refer to them for help. They also have a copy of the National Manual of Policy & Procedure although half of them rarely refer to it.

Diocesan Highlights

Only half of the councils in the diocese have supported the Strategic Planning by passing along the info and responding to surveys. It has given a council the opportunity to discuss how the standing committees would fit under the new structure consisting of the 3 pillars: Faith, Service, Social Justice. Members have been encouraged to be patient and open to the new process.

A few took advantage of attending fall regional meetings as well as diocesan/provincial/national conventions. They have promoted the League not only at the diocesan but also the provincial and national levels.

Diocesan Highlights(cont'd)

The past presidents continue to work at all activities and events in their councils.

Past presidents are trying to find ways to encourage members to take on leadership roles in their councils. They are also working on bringing in new members to ensure their councils survive.

Several councils are going to be celebrating their 100th anniversary in the next year or two.



ARCHIVAL TIPS The passing on of history and tradition gives members a sense of pride and importance in belonging to the League.

The past president should: • prepare an archival index of all materials • arrange for the safe storage of archival material • preserve the council history through scrapbooks, photograph albums and minutes.

Marriage and Family

Only 20% of our councils attended workshops or seminars on family such as marriage preparation and encounter weekends. Few of them have special events on Mother's and Father's Day, while a few make notes of anniversaries, have liturgical celebrations for married couples. No one celebrates National Family Week. Almost all councils had support in place for those suffering domestic abuse.

Sanctity of Life

Our councils made a good showing at pro-life dinners, life chains and pro-life walks. Some participated in 40 days for life, march for life and offered masses for pro-life. 11% did not participate in anything. Many members made the effort to view the movie "Unplanned" and attended the Regional days to hear the presentation on the horrors of abortion and it's affects on mental health. Almost no one has learned about Pope John Paul's Theology of the Body. Most monetary donation were given to local pro-life, Euthanasia Prevention Coalition and to pregnancy and Family support services. A few give to Campaign Life, Priests for Life and Life Canada. 10% did not give funds to this ministry. Brochures on pro-life from National were not purchased or displayed in their churches. Many had not met with pro-life legislators while most wrote letters of support for CWL resolutions on Abortion and Euthanasia. Most councils do pray for the protection of life.

Ministry to Youth

Most councils have not started to promote the next World Youth Day in Lisbon, Portugal in 2022. Over half the councils do not participate in programmes for young people. Most of the youth are encouraged to serve at events and in choirs. Some become catechists, lectors, ushers and help with cleaning. No one had a Catholic Girls League. Very little sponsorship was given to youth. There was a little support given to summer camps, Sunday schools and Steubenville. Over 2/3's have not purchased subscriptions to Catholic Magazines, videos or books for use in the local community.

Ministry to the Disabled

A lot of councils brought communion, prayed for, visited or called, sent cards and brought gifts for special occasions and provided transportation to the disabled.

Ministry to Seniors

Most councils provide for seniors by make a point of bringing communion, visit, include in activities, send cards, phone, provide transport, share a meal and organize events. A few have encouraged sharing their faith stories, involve them in intercessory prayer and provide respite care.

Ministry to Widowed

Almost all councils provided services for the newly widowed. Cards, calls, visits, funeral lunches, prayer and prayer shawls as well as an honour guard. A few councils have ensured a bereavement programme.

Ministry to Separated & Divorced

Almost no councils looked for help from the league or sponsored/attended presentation or purchased the brochure "Annulments Today- Merciful and Just". The majority have not focused on this ministry at all.

Vocations

Sending spiritual bouquets, prayers and masses, supporting seminarians, hosting luncheons and donating to retirement funds are a few things councils have done to support our religious. Unfortunately, over 10% of councils do not focus on this ministry.

Participation

The HUG imitative, Euthanasia Prevention, Coalition and the Human Trafficking -On Route were the most participated in activities this past year.

The Canadian League Magazine

80% of parish councils (47) felt the magazine was useful as an educational tool. –the value of the magazine in other areas as a resource tool produced percentages of between 78-75% (46-44) the most useful areas were for advocacy/action and spiritual, followed by convention oral reports and new ideas.

Top three articles of interest were as follows: Winter: *President's Message, Jesus-The Best Communicator!*, and *Listen to Silence*. Fall: *Dignity and Rights of Persons: Human Trafficking in Canada, President's Message* and *From the National Spiritual Advisor* tying with *Highlights from the 99th Annual National Convention*.

Media: for Evangelization

51% of councils (30) promoted faith-orientated programs, the same number of councils from last year, while only 10% (6) promoted World Communications Day, down one council from the year prior.

With regards to Resolution 1978.03 Catholic Press that encouraged members to subscribe to Catholic media, 70% of councils (41) had not done so. The highest number for promotion was 15% (9) for Salt and Light TV, followed by mass for shut-ins and Vision TV each with 12% (7) councils.

Media: to Promote the League

Councils have encouraged members to use media to promote the League in the following ways: CWL Social Media 56% or 33 councils, use the website cwl.ca 71% (42) of councils, use of local media to advertise events 56% (33), phone invitation committee 64% (38) and prepared news releases was under-utilized at 31% or 18 councils only. -73% of councils use email to send minutes and meeting agendas.

Media: Evaluation and Promotion of Good Content

promotional videos are largely unseen with between 23%-12% (13-7) having watched the productions.

44% (26) of councils were unsure if they had spoken out about media content, 24% (14) had, including creating a petition against an anti-Christian movie on Netflix for Christmas and complaints to Canadian Broadcast Corp. regarding content and timing of shows.

Media: Newsletter and Bulletins

Newsletters were produced at 42% (25) of councils mainly by either the communication chair, or the president. –the majority of councils produced the newsletter annually, or twice annually. Most of the newsletters were distributed by email 52% (13), followed by parish mail slots and bulletins.

Articles are contributed to the Diocesan Newsletter biannually and to the provincial ONline newsletter monthly.

Media: Relations

45% of councils have reached out to the local media to benefit the League, with material submitted for publication 31% (18) being the highest, followed by advertising at 24% (14).

Pornography

30% of respondents read articles to become informed about the influence of pornography on children and adults and 22% contacted agencies or reviewed current legislation.

Resolutions remain valuable tools that can be utilized far more than the 42-7% of councils that currently are.

Campaigns done included writing to MPs, MPPs, the ON Route demonstrations, working with FarmTown and Pornography Hurts.

Dignity and Rights of Persons

Councils have become familiar with the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. They supported those suffering from poverty and homelessness; volunteering their time, having speakers, and giving donations. Councils have supported St. Vincent de Paul and the Christmas Giving Trees at their parishes, and supported Right to Life and Birthright through the year.

Social and Economic Justice

Our diocese supported those suffering from Human Trafficking. Many had speakers, donated, and shared the day July 30th with Project ONroute on Highway 401 to end Human Trafficking. Councils visit the homebound and those in retirement and nursing homes regularly. In the last year, members have become more aware of those suffering from Racism and the struggles of Indigenous women.

Refugees, Immigration and Citizenship

Most councils know the difference between a temporary foreign worker, immigrant, and refugee. Many councils worked with their parishes sponsoring immigrant families in their communities. Councils participated in Remembrance Day Services and some sent Christmas cards to the military overseas and wore red on Fridays to support our military.

Canadian Catholic Organization for Development & Peace (CCODP) Members continue to be involved and attended Development & Peace Workshops in their communities. They shared the information with their CWL. Councils supported Development and Peace Share Lent Campaign at their parishes.

Developing Countries

Councils gave to Save a Family Plan, CNEWA, Chalice, Red Cross, and Food for Children. Some councils continued to support aqua boxes with the Rotary Club. Members have become more aware of child labor in developing countries. Some have invited speakers from developing nations to learn more about those nations.

It is very important that our directives are being passed down to the **Legislation Standing Chairperson**, & then to be read by the CWL chairs, then all members at large, Then they in turn can monitor & follow all Governments important bills on all level.

At the 99th annual national convention, national council adopted <u>Resolution 2019.02</u>: <u>Canadian Support for the United Nations Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons</u>; What action has councils taken:84% yes; 13% no.

At the 98th annual national convention, national council adopted <u>Resolution 2018.03</u>: <u>Legislate Designation of Hospice/Palliative Care Services in Facilities to Exclude Medical Assistance in Dying.</u> Please identify what actions your councils have taken.

Some Provincial bills some councils monitored: An overview of the resolutions listed previously, have been presented at meetings. Some long-term overview regarding Long-term Care Beds

Bill regarding applying pressure on family members with respect to MAID Bill regarding the intimidation of medical practitioners to take part in MAID Resolution with respect of abortion & its effect on mental health of woman

Bill 36: cannabis legislation, Mental Health & Addiction care for children & youth. Some responded none.

Bill C14: Euthanasia extension for children, Abortion & Mental Health. Some responded: no; MAID Statute Law Amendment Act2017: most councils responded to be extremely interest. The screening of Fatal Flaws followed by discussions was very well attended by members. Court cases are being monitored such as Quebec Superior Court of Justice September decision to struck down a restriction limiting assisted dying to terminally ill patients concluding the requirement to be an unconstitutional barrier, forcing 2 Quebeckers with incurable conditions to keep on living in great pain.

Some reported it was read & discussed and members were aware. Anti-Abortion: Effect on mental health was discussed, and made aware off. Some responded no, no.

<u>2015.02</u>, <u>2018.02</u> on setting standards for products marketed as flushable (Toilets are not garbage cans) 4 no's 1 N/A.

Pharmaceuticals in our Water very concerned. Members need to pay attention to current issues re: provincial premiers' action against health & education. Discussions re: candidates in upcoming federal election & the right to vote. Councils distributed the letter from Bishop Fabbro on this regard.

Some members are doing a letter writing campaign on 2019.2. some No.

Some supported OnRoute demonstration against Human Trafficking. Some financially supported Farmtown. A local organization rescuing young woman from prostitution & providing counselling. Most councils found it challenging to complete this survey asking if it could not be simplified. Not having a chairperson another point, too time consuming. Some are just not comfortable with a computer. Time to complete this survey because no person to do it Some had no difficulty completing it. Many councils do not have a legislation Chair person, No one wants to take this on. Most members do not see the importance of this chair. I often stressed the importance of legislation Chair The need to keep informed of what the government is doing on all levels. In many councils the information given does not filter down to the councils in general. Members find it overwhelming, & quite confusing

Resolutions Joan Lobsinger

Research and Preparation of Resolutions and Briefs

One council researched and prepared a resolution involving the difficulty of obtaining permanent resident status for religious workers in light of the Express Entry system initiated in 2016. The resolution was returned to them by the Ontario Provincial Review Committee for further research. A second council researched and prepared a resolution that was accepted by the Ontario Provincial Council: Abortion and Mental Health.

Although the majority of the 56 councils (84%) reported they had not considered and studied issues that might become a resolution, 9 of the councils did and 6 of those have discussed these ideas with their council. That is very promising! In fact, one council reported they have an issue of concern and hope to prepare the resolution in 2020.

Only 17% of the councils have a Resolution Chairperson, some of whom attended the resolutions dialogues held at diocesan, provincial and/or national conventions; and some who attended workshops held at diocesan regional days. Most of the chairpersons refer to communiques and/or annual report forms from other levels.

Study and Implementation of Resolutions Passed by Other Levels

Just less than half of the councils, 43%, reported studying the 2019 resolutions presented on cwl.ca.

Action items were followed on these 2019 provincial resolutions: ON.19.02 "Abortion and Mental Health", and ON.19.03 "Long Term Beds". Letters were sent to the Premier, Minister of Health and MPP's.

Some councils continued to act on ON.18.01 "Develop National Standards for Levels of Pharmaceuticals in Canada's Drinking Water" through the "Protect our Water Postcard Campaign". Councils also reported on participating in the Water Conservation Challenge.

Support was given to ON.15.04 "Provision of Regulated Housing for the Chronic, Severely Mentally III" through a local campaign. As a result, \$20,000.00 was awarded to Indwell London which provides stable housing for people leaving mental health hospitals.

42% of the councils reported contacting their federal government representative by writing letters, 11% by phone calls and 16% with a personal visit.

43% of the councils reported contacting their provincial government representative by writing letters, 5% by phone calls and 11% with a personal visit.

44% of the councils reported contacting their local government representative by writing letters, 13% by phone calls and 8% with a personal visit.

The specific actions councils undertook to support resolutions adopted at any level were:

- Made members aware of issues through meetings, emails, or newsletters.
- Signed petitions
- Held letter writing sessions
- Arranged for a guest speaker
- Organized demonstrations
- Mobilized members to address the issue through local outreach

Some councils also reported supporting the "Call for Conscience Campaign" and the "Pornography Hurts Campaign".

At Sacred Heart, we have a fantastic Food Bank. In each Sunday bulletin, we ask for what is needed, such as peanut butter, soup crackers and canned meats. For March, a \$1.00 a day for forty days or what one can afford, will be collected by the Food Bank. There is an evening dinner each week, where a supper is prepared for the homeless, and clothing/socks are given out to the needy as well. There is a great need for visitation in this area for our older and sick, we do our best with ladies from our CWL visiting and taking note of what they need. We are working on a program with the K of C to visit together.

Funerals at our Church are provided with the CWL preparing the "after funeral meals."

Doing, being, assisting, giving, etc. are part of what God wants us to do. Bellelle Guerin saw this need and created the CWL which has been on the move for almost 100 years.

Members of St. Michael's CWL have responded to God's call of serving the needy in various ways. Our council supports a poor family in India through *Save a Family Plan*. We donate money, clothing and various articles to *Canadian Food for Children*, focusing on a different product every year. In 2019, we collected 423 tubes of toothpaste and 573 toothbrushes for oral care in underdeveloped countries. In November, money is donated to The Salvation Army and St. Vincent de Paul from our council, for use in the *Christmas Hamper Program*.

Seventeen H.U.G.(Helping, Understanding & Giving) Bags were assembled and distributed to the men's and women's shelters, to *The Sandwich Guys* who supply the needy living in hotels, to our local Salvation Army and to a local church who runs a free clothing boutique for the poor. One of our members volunteers to make soup for the soup kitchen to feed the hungry.

St. Michael's folk choir, which is composed of CWL members, volunteers to sing at our local nursing home once a month. It is always an enjoyable time for both the residents and the CWL! Several members volunteer at the nursing home once a week and visit the residents to help with activities in the home. One member organizes a bingo every month for the residents -complete with prizes and treats!

Several members help organize and volunteer at Vacation Bible School in the community. The children learn about God and how much they are loved by God and others. It is a very successful event where children enjoy and feel accepted. We collected money for a water well in a rural school in Ghana to give water to the thirsty.

CWL members have prayers and an honour guard at the funeral for a deceased sister in the League. These are always well attended. In November, our council placed a wreath at the cenotaph to honour those who gave their lives for us.

To give support to the new Moms at Refuge, a member from our council coordinates the *Baby Bottle Boomerang*, plus our council gives a donation to *Right to Life* along with a baby shower for the same organization. St. Michael's CWL works with *New to You* which organizes a large *Mom to Mom Sale* twice a year for the community. They give us many large boxes of leftover clothing, toys and baby items which we bring to Refuge. Last fall, we needed to use a small trailer to transport so much! These items are received with immense gratitude and a quote in a thank you note from a volunteer is well worth repeating- "Thank you all for helping us do what we love to do and, you can't out give God!".

Members of our council are enthusiastic about helping our brothers and sisters in need. We feel very blessed and grateful to have the ongoing support of such a wonderful community.

How do we as Catholic Women of Canada make a difference in people's lives?

By helping to feed the poor, many are volunteering at Gleaners, who send freeze-dried food all over the world. Serving hot meals for migrant workers, making many donations to St. Vincent de Paul Society and to the Downtown Mission are a variety of ways we feed the hungry.

The Welcome Centre for Women, Street Help, and the Bridge for Youth receive many socks, clothing and personal care products as a result of our yard sale and gently used purse drive.

Being aware of ways we can Care for our Common Home, we promote and pledge to conserve water. We also use paper products instead of styrofoam. Recycling our ink cartridges and properly disposing of used batteries are more ways we are vigilant.



(Clothe the Naked, Shelter the Homeless) - H.U.G. Project – donations were made to: Women's Shelter and Out of the Cold Program (for the homeless). Donations included socks, underwear, money and toiletries. Socks were also provided at Convention per request.

(Feed the Poor) – Four Breakfasts (Free Will Offering) were held following Sunday Masses. This enabled us to feed those unable to afford to purchase their breakfast. We support a Sponsor Child through Chalice. We donate to local Food Bank on a regular basis through the Parish.

(Bury the Dead) - Mass for Deceased Loved Ones of CWL Members – something new this year. On the first Friday of the month Mass is requested for Deceased Loved Ones. Following Mass, snacks and refreshments are available and a time of fellowship enjoyed. We honor the deceased, pray for their souls, and allow those attending to begin to heal from their grief and loneliness. Funeral lunches are provided as requested.

Following the death of a CWL member, they are remembered in prayer at our general meeting, their names provided to National office, and their name entered into our League Book of Life. This handwritten Book of Life is displayed during Mass on All Souls Day, and CWL Masses offered for Deceased. Cards are sent to family members suffering a bereavement. Also, Mass is offered for all deceased CWL members in November.

(Visit the Sick) — We visited and Engaged Residents in Christmas carolling at local nursing/retirement homes. Each home was presented with a large poinsettia, and snacks/refreshments allowed us to spend quality time with residents. Cards are sent to those sick or recovering from surgery. CWL members, through the church, bring communion to the homebound, conduct weekly communion service at a nursing home, coordinate Parish Prayerline requests, and distribute Bulletins and prayer lists to retirement homes.

(Give Water to the Thirsty) – A Spiritual Reflection Day, "Laudato Si, Care for our Common Home", was held which focused on making changes in our daily lives to protect and care for Mother Earth. Protect Our Water postcards were distributed to the Parish for signing, collected and sent to Ottawa urging national standards or laws to protect our water.

(Ransom the Captive) – Members distributed to parishioners for signing, 'Pornography Hurts' postcards; then collected and mailed them to Ottawa. Members organized and attended the Project ONRoute Human Trafficking Media Screen Awareness Campaign on July 30 in Woodstock.

In December we had an amazing guest speaker, Eugene Dufour, who is a Therapist at STAR Family Health Team. He spoke on providing excellent and compassionate care for people in need of end of life care. St. Peter's has always been a great supporter of our local retirement residence, Blue Water Rest Home, so it fit really well with our continued support of 'Visiting the Sick'. Weekly we have a group of council members who help Father Matthew George with a mass for the residents. We donate annually to an 'Ice Cream Fund' where the residents look forward to their weekly treat. Each March we participate in 'The World Day Of Prayer' on-site at the Rest Home so all can attend. It's beautiful to see their smiling faces singing along with the program.

'Feeding the Hungry' is something all the people of the Parish at St. Peter's take seriously. We not only have food drives to help fill the shelves after major holidays but collect monthly for our local Blessings Community Store. As per Patricia Langford, Spiritual Development stated, "Members donate hours of their time voluntarily in the store, picking up donations and presenting items for sale to help when money is the best answer. The hearts and hands of these ladies bring me near to tears when I see all the hidden little acts of Corporal works that go on here day after day. I have lived in many parishes over the years but never has this generosity been as obvious, genuine and unselfish to my eyes".

In the Gospel of Matthew (Mt.25:31-46), Jesus explains that, at the end of time, the Son of Man will come to judge us on the deeds which we have done, including to feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, welcome the stranger, clothe the naked, care for the sick and visit the imprisoned. During 2019 members of our CWL council have tried to do these things as well as trying to alleviate some of the problems of the homeless and those who suffer loneliness. Food and drink collected during the World Day of the Poor campaign was shared between the St. Marys Salvation Army Food Bank and the St. Vincent de Paul in Stratford. We also made a donation of money and grocery cards to the local Food Bank.

An astonishing 373 pairs of new warm socks (some of them hand knitted) were collected for the less fortunate. These socks and gently used clothing items were donated to Coats for Kids, House of Blessing, ShelterLink, Optimism Place and a temporarily homeless man who stayed in St. Marys during the late winter and early spring.

Some of our members visit people in the two local nursing homes on a regular basis, while other members assist in the day programs in the nursing homes and the local hospital. A few of our members prepare and lead ecumenical prayer services at one of the nursing homes while others serve as extraordinary Eucharistic Ministers bringing Communion to the ill and those who cannot get to church.

Although we do not actually bury the dead, several of our members sing in the Resurrection Choir and serve as lectors when required, we also have two teams of CWL members who alternate in providing a luncheon for family and friends after the funeral. Each November we organize and participate in an Annual Memorial Mass for all parishioners who have died during the year.

An outstanding event for us occurred in the autumn when one of our members travelled to Masakae, Uganda with the OMACARE group to work at a shelter which assists young homeless boys to leave life on the streets. These boys were given shelter, clothing, food, medical care and education to prepare them to eventually find work and a safe permanent place to live. We were thrilled to be able to donate to this venture and to hear about it when she returned.

We enjoyed participating in these deeds and hope one day to hear the Son of Man say to us: "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these, my brothers, you did it to me". (Mt.25:40).

Ransom the Captive: Members were in the picketing blitz one day and drove to OnRoute near London on Highway 401 to show their support and bring awareness that young girls and women are being lured unknowingly at first to be used in the sex trade. Police and CWL spoke to the crowds and also Founder Kelly Franklin who started Farm Town in the country where girls can go to a safe place and integrated back into Society. All eleven Ingersoll regional councils were busy in 2019 carrying out activities that focused on Caring for our Common Home (national theme) and homelessness (provincial theme). Over 1000 pairs of socks were collected by councils in preparation for the London Diocesan convention last April in Windsor. Majority of those socks stayed in each council's communities and were taken to shelters and other groups that support those less fortunate. Many councils supported the HUG campaign facilitated by Denise Lalonde-Morris. Councils donated gift cards, toiletries and comfort items to community agencies that help women, men and children. Clothing our naked was achieved by these generous activities.

On July 30th, 2019 Ingersoll region CWL councils had outstanding representation at the #Project Maple Leaf Human Trafficking Awareness event. Members gathered at the Woodstock ONRoute location with their signs highlighting this national crisis targeting young people in our communities. Many councils also donated to Kelly Franklin's Courage for Freedom charity to raise money to allow the media campaign to run during the month of July at all ONRoute locations in Ontario. Protecting our most vulnerable youth is everyone's responsibility.

Lastly, Ingersoll regional councils participated in the "Protect Our Water" postcard campaign. Most councils participated by distributing postcards to their members and parish community. The postcard campaign encouraged the federal government to test for pharmaceuticals in our water sources. Some councils met with their MPs to discuss the issue and present the signed postcards. Our water source is precious and all are dependent on water not only for drink but also to grow our agriculture, water our animals and support cleanliness in our communities.

Above all our members pray. We pray for the unborn, the sick and dying and those struggling with addictions. We pray for those that are vulnerable to human trafficking, euthanasia and abortion. We pray for CWL members that have died and honour them with an honour guard at their funeral or a funeral luncheon for their family and friends. Our faith and commitment to service translates into the numerous hours of work we do for our League, church and community

At different times during the year small groups came together to say the Stations of the Cross and the Rosary at Holy Trinity Church as well as Sakura House for Palliative Care. We also contributed to Hope Box, a Ministry to give hope and inspiration to women who have had miscarriages.

Some members joined in the Hike for Hospice and others gave support to raise money for Sakura House, our local Hospice for Palliative care. Some members participated to raise money in the annual Canadian Cancer Society Relay for Life calling themselves the 'Holy Trinity Flames'. Other group members baked, collected and distributed cookies along with our newsletter to CWL shutins.

During Lent, we collected 552 pairs of socks which we distributed to our local shelters in Woodstock, Operation Sharing, Daso, and Ingamo Homes and Beginnings Pregnancy Care Centre. With the profits from our mint smoothies fundraiser, we distributed gift cards to women in local shelters.

In coordination with Euthanasia Prevention Coalition we have 10 volunteers who were trained for the Compassionate Community Care Project for seniors in Woodstock and surrounding areas.

Our Council participated and supported the #Project Maple Leaf Against Human Trafficking. We also had a 'Pornography Hurts Campaign' signing by members as well as parishioners. Postcards were dropped off to our MP.

Our council challenged our Parish Community to conserve water using different strategies in their households. Also, we coordinated a postcard signing weekend to raise awareness to our Federal government that there is no national standards or laws in pharmaceuticals in drinking water.

Many of our members volunteered their time to help serve at funerals in our Parish. We always have an Honour Guard for deceased CWL members.

Our annual 'Starlight Bazaar' was a big success with the proceeds donated to local charities as well as Canadian and Foreign Missions.

How did St. Peter's work on the seven corporal works of mercy this past year?

Dealing with homelessness and loneliness, we started and continue today discussing, educating sharing our experiences and creating awareness of these provincial themes to our members. The most important starting point was not to judge those that we encounter. Our homeless community has benefited by St. Peter's CWL members trying to better understand them as a person, talking with them, continue to provide money to assist with what they need in the moment, bringing food/meals and distributing gift cards. Human Trafficking was another topic that was further researched, organizing guest speaker Kelly Franklin to educate us the fate of women and men that are enslaved at the hands of organized crime. A wonderful turnout supporting the On Route project in July 2019. Our council supports the work of 519 Pursuit which is very focused on those downtown, assessing their needs and delivering care packages to them that will assist with daily living. Their unique approach of listening to them, developing relationships and ultimately building trust is key in their success. Each individual has very distinct circumstances that can't be fixed by being pigeon holed as experienced when dealing with government agencies.

At our General meetings, cards are circulated for those that are unwell, hospitalized or recent surgeries in order to keep in touch, show our love and support for our sisters . St. Peter's CWL supports monthly masses for our sick, for special intentions and the deceased. We honour, the dedicated service and support of our deceased members by organizing the honour guard at CWL funerals. St. Joesph's Hospice has been an annual destination for donating quilts and presenting a cheque to support their good works. In small groups, we provide our service at the Winter Welcome event, assisting with the provision and serving of meals to St. Vincent de Paul clients, lenten lunches available for a freewill donation, welcoming parishioners as they enter the church for weekend masses. The consolidated effort put forth in the bazaar provides St. Peter's CWL to distribute monetary donations to those community agencies that are providing services to the most vulnerble residents in London. Our work continues every day with each encounter to foster a culture where all life is valued with dignity and respect.

Our members help to feed the hungry by working and contributing at our outreach dinner and a community outreach dinner. They also prepare sandwiches for a local outreach café. Donations of clothing and socks are given to Inn Out of the Cold, Grace Café, Women's Emergency Shelter and Teen Center. Visits are made to bereaved families following funeral.

We financially support St. Vincent de Paul, Women's Rural Resource Centre, Salvation Army Food Bank, Helping Hands monthly free lunch.

We donated \$1,500 to the SWOYFC organization. Also, donation to Guyana Outreach – \$500 annually.

We facilitate Mass or prayer service weekly at two nursing homes. Our pastoral care group visits hospitals and shut-ins. We support Lambeth L'Arche Home and St. Joseph's Hospice with profits from our Good Friday meatless soup lunch.

We provide Honour Guards and prayer service at funeral homes for deceased members.

We provide altar service and choir members at funeral masses for deceased members and visit the bereaved family members.

Sarnia Lambton Annual Report 12 Councils There are 12 Councils in Sarnia Lambton. Six in the city of Sarnia and six in the County of Lambton including Corunna, Port Lambton, Petrolia, Wyoming, Watford and Forest. The work that our League does is widespread. This past year our Sisters have really demonstrated the Corporal Works of Mercy regarding homelessness and loneliness. All our Councils enthusiastically took part in collecting socks for Convention for the homeless. It didn't stop there. Most Councils collected socks and toiletries for Christmas hampers. The Councils in Sarnia participate in The Irish Miracle for St. Vincent de Paul and Salvation Army and for Cyclone Aid for the Inn of the Good Shepherd. They are both city wide food drives with St. Pat's students and many volunteers helping at the 1 day event in December and again in the Spring. They are both successful events with all Councils contributing monetarily and physically. Our favourite general meeting has to be the Christmas meeting, where we begin with mass and then a potluck dinner. At this point we are able to sit back and bask in the glow of all the hard work that took place the previous month. The 2019 Christmas bazaar in November was a huge success, assuring us that we could give generously to those who are in need at Christmas. Donations were made to St. Vincent de Paul to help with their Christmas hampers and to the Inn of the Good Shepherd to assist with their work for those in need.

Throughout the year, we have given donations to a variety of charities and to the education of our children. As the League celebrates its 100th Anniversary, it will step back in time and honor the fact that the formation of the League was Miss Bellelle Guerin's response to Bishop Emile Legal, OMI of Edmonton request to assist immigrants finding their way to western cities to provide protection and support to those women seeking work. As a result of Bishop Legal's invitation and Bellelle's response that the Catholic Women's League was formed with Miss Guerin elected the first National President.

The ladies of Our Lady of the Assumption took bold steps to respond to the needs of the Parish and the Community and organized a Catholic Women's League and on April 3, 1921, Charter No. L-083 was granted. The Council operated for 70 years of the over 250 years the parish has been in existence, however unfortunately and with a great deal of sadness, on May 17, 1993 the decision to disband was made.

Like Bishop Legal, who extended an invitation over 100 years ago, our Pastor and Spiritual Advisor asked me on October 20, 2017 "why doesn't Our Lady of Assumption have a Catholic Women's league?" I took this as my invitation to research the history, and with the assistance of our President, Rebecca McCarrell, other members of the Diocesan Executive, the steps to re-activate began, with a search of the archives, research, meetings etc., however all of our efforts bore fruit and the re-activation of Our Lady of the Assumption Parish became effective Jan. 1, 2020.

We stand on the shoulders of all those who went before us and are proud to resume the mission and mandate of the League honoring its original objectives to contribute to the understanding and growth of religious freedom, social justice, peace and understanding. Last September our parish launched an Outreach Program called "Assumption Cares." 

- We are blessed to be able to spend time with our four grandchildren who range in age from 3 to 8 years old.


Past President's Report
