Dear Sisters', where has the summer gone? I hope it has been a time of rest, fun and travel for you. It has been a busy summer for me and other members of your Diocesan Executive attending both Provincial Convention in Thunder Bay and National in Regina; it was a time for learning and also spiritual growth, along with much laughter.

At Provincial Convention we heard many good speakers. Although the weather was cold and rainy most of the time, Thunder Bay was very happy for the rain and thanked southern Ontario for bringing it. Rev. Msgr. Pat Stilla V.G. of Thunder Bay spoke and related that we need to "Tell the world what we are doing to celebrate our celebrations". We are women of faith and the CWL should be the carbon copy of Christ. Betty Ann Brown Davidson, our National President, did a presentation. I have watched Betty Ann climb the ladder from serving on Provincial Council to becoming the National President. She spoke of a trip she took and how she saw the Lord. Provincial Council continues to award 10 Bishop Pappin Bursaries of \$300 each, to a seminarian who returns to his studies in the fall. Please continue to support the Bishop Pappin Bursary.

This year elections for the Provincial Council were held and as your President I had the privilege to vote for you. Our own Pat Rivest

was elected as the Provincial Recording Secretary and Lucy Hendrikx as the Provincial Treasurer. There were 112 CWL members that attended the convention for the first time and in total there were 317 delegates that attended the convention - London diocese was well represented.

My husband and I enjoyed a much needed rest and holiday on Rose Lake at Wil & Lee Levergood's camp in Bruce Mines in the quiet woods.

August brought travel again to National Convention in Regina. After getting settled in our room we had to move as our bathroom had a problem. Pat Rivest and Carol Richie were in the room next to us, we were in corner rooms and they had the same issue - you flushed the toilet in our room and the water came and it did the same in their room so the big move was on. But of course the rooms were not ready. After a great supper and a Country Hoedown the move was on at 10:00 p.m. Now you must remember it was Regina time which made it 12:00 a.m. Ontario time. Needless to say, it was a late night for all 4 of us. Sunday we took a city bus tour which took us to the RCMP Depot where we were able to tour the museum, it was a real experience learning the history of the RCMP.

The opening and closing Masses were held at Holy Rosary Cathedral. The stained glass windows were beautiful.

Monday we listened to many great speakers. Sister Fay Trombley spoke of the First Nations in Canada. She has been in the north for 8 years and shared with the members her work. Father Bill Burke spoke on the Year of Faith and how we are not just tea, sandwiches and cookie women. He quoted Pope Francis—"Faith is born within an encounter with God". Father Bill also told us the "Good times are a gift from God and in bad times he is always with us". Bishop Currie, told us in his talk that because we live in a secular world—we must consider what 99,000 women can do to bring Sundays back to what they were.

As we begin our fall meetings and start our membership drives, I encourage councils to let the women in the parish know what the Catholic Women's League is all about - not just tea and pie ladies, but also the power we have with both the Provincial and Federal Governments. Let them know that we are a national group of women 99,000 strong and we speak for them, whether it is to keep our Catholic Schools open and support the students. Do they know we have two bursaries for two women seeking to further their education along with spiritual growth?

It was a wonderful summer and I was so proud to represent you at

Here comes September and we are back to a regular routine with kids or grandchildren going back to school, CWL meetings starting up again as well as attending other church activities that normally start up in September. You can tell that the summer is gone as the weather gets cooler, and the days are shorter . . . the vacation is over! For me this is particularly true as I start back to work after being off for three months. How time flies!

My summer has been most fruitful! I attended the Provincial Convention in Thunder Bay, where we enjoyed beautiful weather and long summer days. We visited the countryside and we feasted on the regional fare. We were entertained with a variety of quizzes – good food, good fun and were fulfilled with faith filled liturgies and wonderful speakers throughout the whole convention. The London Diocese was quite proud to have Pat Rivest and Lucy Hendrikx elected to the Provincial Council as Recording Secretary and Treasurer respectively. Congratulations ladies and best of luck in your new duties.

Our keynote Speaker Rev. Msgr. Pat Stilla, spoke on the “Celebrations and Challenges as Women of Faith.” We seem to think that celebrations are good and challenges are bad . . . or are they? He pointed out that challenges get us excited and give us opportunities to grow. The CWL should be a living carbon copy of God in the world – like Christ, we should be a light to the world. Also

women must be encouraged to discern, to discover their own gifts. He cautioned however, that we must use only the gifts that are truly ours, and noted some of the enemies of leadership – envy, jealousy, unhealthy competition, ambition, false motivation and burnout.

Another speaker Anne Jamieson, spoke about the “Spiritual Resiliency of Women” and how we are able to use the resources of prayer, faith and our relationship with God to help us bounce forward and through adversity. Not only did Anne have a good message for us, she truly was a wonderful example as she was stuck on the tarmac at the airport as her flight to Toronto was cancelled because of all the rain and the flooding. CWL sisters brought her back to the hotel and found her a room, a warm bed, a good meal and a glass of wine to keep her going until her flight the next day. Naturally, she gracefully handled this with a smile on her face!

We were also enthralled with a wonderful talk from Grand Chief Harvey Yesno. Chief Yesno referred to the poverty, family dysfunction, suicide, children under the care of social services, unemployment and disease that is so prevalent among his people, and the fact that poverty has no friends, no security and no future. It is his feeling that working with the federal government and together with other chiefs, the opportunity

exists to change this situation. He presented Marlene Pavletic, Provincial President and Betty Anne Brown, National President with a pair of moccasins before his talk, as it is their custom to give gifts before, rather than after their presentation.

You could tell that a lot of work went into a workshop given by the Spiritual Development Chair, the Community Life Chair and the Christian Family Life Chair – a good review on the responsibilities and activities within each of these committees.

I was further blessed to attend the National Convention in Regina, Saskatchewan where once again we enjoyed the entertainment, the food and the liturgies at the different venues. Our speakers were wonderful as we listened to Sr. Fay Trombley and her work with the First Nations in Canada. We were also able to visit the artwork of different artists as coordinated by Louise Tessier and enjoy her talk “Witnessing to Faith through Art” and purchase her book “The Garden Way of the Cross.” We also listened to a very touching presentation by four of our life members who talked about different events in their life where they had seen the Lord. These ladies talked from “the heart” and we were all affected as we listened to their personal life experience on how God was working in their lives. The banquet was wonderful with over 500 people in attendance

The Sister of Service have had their lives linked with the CWL for quite some time and they are the ones who donated a substantial amount of money to the CWL to start up a foundation to formally train women in Leadership. - Resolution 2013.02 was withdrawn.

Convention! Thanks for coming!
Thanks for your Evaluations!

Wow! Wasn't that a great convention! I certainly was exhausted upon returning home...but in a good way, refreshed and ready to move on!

Thank you for the great response with evaluations this year. A couple ladies didn't like the layout, but in defense of this - it was mirrored from the "Catch the Fire" Evaluations for this year. Next year, we will try a different form.

367 members attended the convention on Tuesday, 282 attended on Wednesday. Of these, I received 173 evaluations.

I am going to answer some of the more poignant remarks / questions raised on the evaluation sheets (see we really do read them).

1. Purpose of the Yearly Convention:

Per our Constitution & Bylaws, we are required to have a yearly meeting where the business of our council is presented to members of the said council. In this case, the council is the London Diocesan Council. The business of the council is reported in two ways: a) the report book which contains the information from each standing committee and office of the council; b) the oral reports given by the elected officers of the Council. The report book information and the oral report contain different information. Motions must be presented upon (financial decisions, order of business, etc.) and a vote

recorded. Resolutions must be presented, and votes taken. Bi-yearly, election of officers takes place. These are your choices for leadership at the Diocesan level. The Conventions are also there to distribute information to members, bring members together in fellowship, friendship and sharing, and to deepen our spirituality.

2. Why can't the convention be one day or on a weekend:

With a Diocese as large as London (the largest in Canada, by the way), it takes some time to report according to the bylaws of our organization. We could make this one day, but we would not be able to put in all the components that currently take place. When resolutions are submitted, they must be presented, time given to inform, debate, and change wording before going to a vote during the main convention time. Our spiritual time would not be as much a part of us...think of the masses, the prayer services, and all that you would miss out on...the Crowning of Mary is a highlight of our opening day! There are two problems with a weekend - 1) because of the commitment of our Spiritual Advisors to their parishes, we would not be able to have them join us; 2) convention facilities in the larger urban area triple in price for a Friday or Saturday venue.

3. We don't like to sit through voting that doesn't pertain to us...Parallel Programming

The current executive was well aware of the downfall of having everyone sit through the tedious voting for the constitution and bylaws. A parallel programme is always the right answer for these situations. However, our

facilities this year did not have the room for us to divide into two groups. Next year, in Windsor with a larger facility, a parallel programme will be offered for the non-voting members. The facilities are larger. Also, some parallel programming may increase the cost of the convention, and we are attempting to keep costs to a minimum.

4. Convention Meals - Price, set-up, food, hospitality

I really would encourage anyone who has not had the opportunity to work on a convention to volunteer at the next one in your region. It really is an eye-opening experience! Let me give a little background on venues, food and costs.

Conventions are usually taking place in large halls that come equipped with proper ventilation systems (heat and cooling, hopefully), chairs, tables, people to set things up, tear them down, plan, run errands, hydro, water, washroom facilities, cleaners, and more...so you can see there are a lot of "happenings" in the background. Now...all of that is without any food. Did you say you were hungry? Well...that's the topping of the cake! The convention centers offer catering (most of the time), and have the same type of background expenses that I have mentioned above - with added costs of multiple servers, chef, cooks, prep people, dishwashers, decorators and more. All of this costs money! Has anyone planned a wedding recently? The good point is that the convention center

reduces the cost of the convention rooms (main room, lobby use, book room, prayer room, etc) dependent on the amount of food that is ordered for meals. The meal cost is usually about \$16/\$18 before taxes and gratuities for lunches; and \$32 / \$36 for banquets. So, to date, lunches are sold to you at \$20 and banquet at \$40 to recoup the cost of the meals...***but the bonus is for every lunch or banquet/dinner meal we sell, the cost of the convention rooms are reduced!*** Did you know that???? The last convention in Chatham, the majority of the cost of the convention center was covered by the meals sold. The last convention in Windsor, all the convention facility cost was covered by the meals sold. **THIS ALLOWS US TO HAVE THE REGISTRATION FEE FOR THE CONVENTION AT \$25.** If we were unable to recoup these costs, the registration fee would need to be raised. Most other organizations charge upwards of \$100 to attend a convention.

5. Why does Roll Call need to be done every day?

According to our Constitution & By-Laws, an accurate count of the voting councils attending the annual meeting needs to be recorded for each session. Because women may have registered but not attended, this count must be done in the convention room to ensure that the

numbers are accurate for any votes taken. Also, when doing instructed votes, the council must have sent in the instruction for the vote to be taken. Roll Call is again taken because this is the method of cross referencing

6. What is the Purpose of the Hospitality Room?

It seems that there is a huge misunderstanding of the purpose of the Hospitality Room in this instance. The Hospitality Room is for the **Convention Committee Volunteers**. It allows them a quiet place for a break, refreshment, and a place to do the necessities. This room is not generally open to the convention as a whole. It is a place for information to be exchanged between committee members, a private place to discuss and find resolutions for problems that may arise, etc. It also serves as a secure room to store convention materials and articles.

7. Comments about audio-visual equipment and presentations.

We had many comments about the audio video equipment. The London Diocesan Council and the convention committee do **NOT** have full control of this equipment. The equipment is supplied by the facility (sometimes with a charge). The microphones, speakers, screens, and connection condition are the sole responsibility of the facility. Our council and/or speakers supply the

presentations that you view only. Because a/v skills are in demand, a technician was hired in Stratford to assist with these issues. However, his skills are also hampered by the equipment provided by the facility.

The London Diocesan Council diligently works at creating presentations for the convention. Given the background of each council member, technical / presentation skills for computers aren't always available. As a volunteer organization, we do the best we can. If you feel that you are able to contribute to the convention, other meetings and website, please contact communications@cwllondon.ca to volunteer.

TIDBITS FROM YOUR QUESTIONS ABOUT CONVENTIONS

Quiet in Church, is this needed?

Some churches have abandoned the culture that Catholics grew up with: when you enter church, silence prevails. Catholics believe in the Real Presence and in every church the light at the tabernacle serves as a confirmation and reminder of God's presence. Some believe the chatting in church before and after Holy Mass is a disturbance. Others believe that the greeting of friends, neighbours and the welcoming of others is an extension of their Christian beliefs. As Catholic Women we must find a way to bring both of these beliefs into existence. So we must be tolerant of each other, and find our quiet sanctuary in our own hearts, and ... welcome others with a quieter spirit so that both beliefs can be respected. At future gatherings, an announcement for a quiet period before Mass will be made. So come early for the meet & greet, then quiet your soul in the presence of God to celebrate with all!

Banquet Service at Conventions

Because of the restrictions some facilities may encounter to properly service guests for banquets, each convention committee will need to consider a cap on banquet attendees should their banquet facility have a maximum seating capacity. Consideration will be given to full convention attendees, spiritual advisors, then banquet tickets only on a first ordered basis. There is much to be done and I would like to offer a few suggestions for your council to consider this fall:

At the 2013 National Convention held in August in Regina, **Resolution 2013-01 Building Relationships and Partnerships with Canada's Indigenous Peoples** was passed to encourage all CWL members and councils to reach out to the indigenous peoples in our communities. So I now encourage your council to consider implementing one or several of the suggestions in the Action Plan of this resolution. For example - invite a speaker from an indigenous community to a general meeting, or plan to celebrate the Feast Day of Saint Kateri Tekakwitha on April 17th 2014, or invite indigenous people to partner in a prayer service followed by a social to share cultural food, music and dance.

Elder Abuse: Please do not forget the seniors in our communities and always be aware that Elder Abuse continues to occur in our region of Ontario. It is a crime and must be stopped. Any senior can become a victim of abuse and reports show that between 4% and 10% of seniors will experience some form of abuse in their lifetime. Abuse is often committed by someone known to the victims, including family members, friends, caregivers or neighbours and can include physical violence, psychological harm, financial abuse and neglect. The Ontario Network for the Prevention of Elder Abuse is one source to obtain more information. <http://onpea.org>

What a remarkable summer I have had getting to know the warmth and the friendship and the genuine concerns of some wonderful First Nation people. It began with an opportunity to spend two weeks in Haines Junction, Yukon Territory, with a friend who has a ministry there. My first encounter was with a remarkable 83-year-old Kluane Elder named Grace Johnson and another named Lena Johnson and an Aishihik Elder named Rosalee Washington. These women are looked to as women of wisdom, because of their lived out experience, for guidance and counsel. Grace takes a 2-hour drive up the Alaska Highway weekly to teach southern tutchone, the language of their people, in the Kluane First Nation school in Burwash Landing. She also teaches the young adults how to make gopher snares from eagle feathers, how to tan moose and other hides the old way and how to do the beautiful beading on the moccasins, mukluks and mitts she also makes. She showed me how to make a woman's cape from 100 gopher pelts and informed me, "that is a lot of work." Grace and Lena tell great stories of their people and the animals that surround them. Rosalee told me one of the 'big monkeys' (sasquatch) that live in the mountains there. The Kluane First Nation people lived for centuries in the Kluane National Park area as hunter-gatherers until 1947 when the Alaska Highway was built. Today, along with the Champagne-Aishihik First Nations they work toward self-government. I am

amazed at such an enormous evolution over such a tiny time span and how they work with our federal government towards an infra structure compatible with our own.


Only a few short weeks after my visit to the Yukon, came a visit to Thunder Bay and the CWL Provincial Convention. On Monday of convention a group of ladies and I left the hotel at 5:15 am for a sunrise service on the shore of Lake Superior. At the marina we entered the Spirit Garden, Celebration Circle and Honouring Circle area used by First Nation people for various services. Our leader, Wendy, led us through a service that honoured the water beings and we did this by wrapping our gifts of tobacco, sweets and shiny objects in a blue fabric bundle and setting it, along with a gift of water, into the lake. The service had beautiful rituals with smudge pots and smoke for purification and one with the sharing of a pipe. It made me think of the interconnectedness of all people with people and all people with nature. On Tuesday we were blessed to have Grand Chief Harvey Yesno come to speak to us at noon. He said his name came from an ancestor who was an original treaty chief and whose language in English was either 'yes' or 'no'. Chief Yesno said that when the treaties were signed 108 years ago, they thought they were doing a good thing but the resulting reality is high unemployment (double our unemployment rate), high family dysfunction, high suicide rates and disease. He said, "poverty is a

disease of disrespect" and when economy is poverty it equals hopelessness.

He advocates for power lines and roads to transport food at reasonable prices so diets can be balanced, not cheap. He talked of the need for nuclear families as a solution for the sad reality of the 'fatherlessness' suffered by his people. He indicated welfare was not a solution rather, if you don't work, you don't eat, which led to concerns about education and meaningful employment. He thought CWL could help in initiatives to train First Nation leaders to educate and give workshops in communities on budgeting, parenting, and so to help First Nations carry their own loads, as entitlement is not a good thing. He also spoke of environmental concerns. I found him as I found the women Elders of the Yukon: warm, friendly and with genuine love and concern for his people.

In a memo from Anne-Marie Gorman, National Legislation Chairperson last April, she said, " ... encourage members to review the status of Bill C-45 *Jobs and Growth Act, 2012*, as it pertains to Aboriginal and First Nations peoples." Please consider yourselves encouraged.

I will do what I did this year - print extra's and take orders at convention



*National Convention Report—Regina, Saskatchewan—August 11/14, 2013—

Our arrival in Regina was to sunny warm temperatures and began with a country hoedown and buffet. Wonderful entertainment! On Sunday morning we embarked on a tour of the city of Regina and the headquarters and training centre of the RCMP! Sunday afternoon we discussed the resolutions. More about them later in my report!

We were part of 700 sisters in the League who attended the National Convention. Holy Rosary Cathedral was the gathering space for the celebration of the Eucharist. Archbishop Daniel Bohan spoke of faith and hope in his homily, encouraging us to “let our journey through life be carried on the wings of hope”. Opening Ceremonies concluded with President Betty Anne Brown-Davidson likening a convention to coming home to family. A reception followed back at the Delta Hotel.

Monday began with the Eucharist celebrated by Bishop Thevenot of Prince Albert. “Share the Lord in your gentleness, love and care to your children and grandchildren and to the world, which is so in need of understanding, support and forgiveness”, was the message he shared. He challenged us not to focus so much on ourselves or the organization, but on the mission of the League and the Lord would take care of the rest. Members took a few moments to honour deceased members and Spiritual Advisors in a touching tribute where Provincial Presidents presented a red rose in memory of those deceased members

from their provinces and the President presented a white rose in memory of Spiritual Advisors who have died.

Our first keynote speaker on Monday was Sr. Fay Tremblay who began by opening her arms to us and declaring, “What a powerhouse of faith and love and joy!” Sr. Fay works with the Inuvialuit peoples in Tuktoyaktuk in the Canadian Arctic, north of the Arctic circle. These peoples are not first nations peoples since they came from Mongolia about 5,000 years ago. She shared that for her being a missionary involves knowing the people you are with and bringing the Gospel. She continually asks herself, “Who are the people and what good news do they need to hear?” That idea made me think the same; as League members who are the people we are in contact with and what good news do they need to hear? Sr. Fay opens her small home to provide religious services, a place for the children to play, helping wherever there is a need. She beamed when talking of the children, telling their stories and pointing out their immense powers of concentration. These are people who are formed by the land, people who live by the sun which shines 24 hours a day in spring and summer and is dark 24 hours a day in winter, people who love to laugh and people who need hope.

Louise Tessier spoke on “Witnessing to Faith Through Art”. She creates ceramic art tiles. Her love of gardening inspired her to

design 15 ceramic art tiles for Father Thomas Stanley’s book, “The Garden Way of the Cross.” These tiles were part of a beautiful art gallery in the Prayer Room at the convention. She reminded all of us that our experiences of gardening are as varied as our experiences of faith.

Bishop Emeritus Gerald Weisner spoke on the topic, “Women as Missionaries in the Church and the World Today”. He referenced Pope Francis’ words, “Being a missionary means being a disciple of Christ, listening attentively to Him and following Him faithfully.” The Bishop praised us for our missionary work, announcing, “The church needs you; you are dedicated, wonderful and enthusiastic missionaries.” We believe in a “talking God” who wants us to seek the face of Jesus in the Word of God, in the official teaching of the Church, especially the documents of Vatican II, in prayer since “prayer is the one thing that can conquer God” (Tertullian) and in mission to others. As always, we need to be aware that in reality God searches for us first. Through Baptism and Confirmation we are called to be on that mission. Those who fail to contribute to the life of the Church are no good to the Church and no good to themselves. He pointed out the need for us to work with our priests collaboratively, cooperatively and with co-responsibility. Speaking of the role of women he said that

every time there is an intervention of God in our world there is always a woman involved, for example, Abraham and Sarah and most importantly, the Incarnation. He called us as women to be involved in the New Evangelization because of our charisms of genius, wisdom, compassion and mystery. Faith is professed with word and heart. Spiritual growth will “cost” us something. In conclusion he asked us, “Why continue to eat spiritual cardboard when there are so many opportunities for rich feasts?”

In very moving speeches, Honorary Life Members Irene Lefort, Claire Heron, Agnes Bedard and Danielle McNeil-Hessian shared their personal encounters with the Lord Jesus Christ.

Irene Lefort shared the story of Jesus appearing to her at the top of a mountain in an unexplainable vision at a Saskatchewan retreat: with arms wide open the Lord said to her, “I’m not through with you yet; I will give you what you need.”

Claire Heron referred to Genesis 16, where Hagar, at the spring, says, “I have now seen the One who sees me.” Agnes Bedard says she saw the eyes of the Lord in the face of her husband, Jim, who says “his garden is his church,” where, in pain, he kneels and weeds the garden to make his own mulch.

Finally, Danielle McNeil-Hessian shared the story of her son Robert’s

remarkable recovery after an accident in California left him brain damaged. She says she saw the Lord in his recovery and in the prayers and people who were with him that day.

On Tuesday after Mass Fr. Bill Burke spoke on the Year of Faith. He is the past Director of Liturgy with the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops. He began his address stating that he gets very angry when people refer to the CWL as a group known for coffee, tea and sandwiches. “If I were a politician in this room right now, I’d be very nervous.” He then spoke of the meaning of Faith. We hear that Faith is a gift. Of course it’s a gift but that is far too simplistic. God doesn’t say, “This one gets the gift, this one not.” The door of faith is always open. He told the cute story of two women at a thrift store, one the size of a rope (his words), the other his size (he’s a big man), fighting over a piece of clothing and the sign on the bin “ONE SIZE FITS ALL”. There is a diversity in God’s creation; there is a diversity of faith experiences. In *Lumen Fidei*, Pope Francis states that an encounter with God opens the door of faith. In the story of Lazarus Jesus says, “Unbind him.” The root of the word ‘unbind’ also means forgive. Over and over God rolls back the stones of our sins, our apathy, our complacency; this is conversion, a turning of the whole person to God and it is ongoing, a lifetime journey of dying and rising—the Paschal Mystery. Faith is personal but never private—there is

a need for community. Every person walking through our church doors are living Mysteries of the Rosary—Joyful, Sorrowful, Glorious, Luminous. Imagine that! Christianity is built on stories of real people dying and rising by the love of God. Conversion is that encounter with God in the most unexpected places—be prepared to have God surprise us. Faith requires knowledge but it must be accompanied by an encounter with Jesus. Faith is a question of trust in a person, so “credible” witness is crucial today. We are a community of sinners—Pope Francis even admits to being a sinner. Thomas the Apostle was a heretic, denying the resurrection of Jesus but the community did not throw him out. We also need to take great care that we not make decisions about who gets to stay in our faith communities. The last thing Father Bill spoke about was the loss of the gift of Sunday which is the Lord’s Day and Our Day to become more human and strengthen our relationships. The question, “Why do Jews keep the Sabbath?” The answer: “The Jews don’t keep the Sabbath; the Sabbath keeps the Jews”. We as Christians can substitute our name in place of “Jews”. He spoke of a woman who had lived as a slave in the southern U.S. She told him, “On Sunday we did not work; on Sunday we were allowed to live like human beings.” Sunday celebrates God’s promises kept.

Business reports followed his talk. Each Provincial President and the President of the Military Ordinariate gave a report. President Betty Anne and Secretary-Treasurer Judy Lewis presented their reports. Barb Dowding reported on Catch the Fire. Archbishop Martin Currie encouraged Spiritual Advisors to come to Provincial and National Conventions.

Our own Pat Rivest was installed as a Life member in a moving ceremony.

On Wednesday the Sisters of Service spoke of their generous participation in a Voluntary Fund with the CWL to provide women with opportunities to study and grow in their faith. Kathryn Perry spoke of her book, “The Courage to Dare”, the story of Catherine Donnelly, foundress of the Sisters of Service. A lot of Catherine Donnelly’s words and ideas dovetail with the words and ideas of the CWL.

Reports continued from Margaret Ann Jacobs, Fran Lucas and Peggy Roche, chairpersons of Christian Family Life, Community Life and Health and Education respectively.

Ann Chase was a guest speaker and also a 15 year survivor who spoke on Ovarian Cancer Awareness. It is the most fatal women’s cancer since 70% will die within five years of diagnosis, yet when diagnosed early,

has a 90% success rate. The Pap test does not detect ovarian cancer. The HPV Vaccine does not prevent it. There is no screening test as yet. The symptoms are varied and vague such as bloating, pelvic pain, abdominal pain, difficulty eating, feeling full quickly, urinary symptoms (urgency, frequency), change in bowel habits. The tests now available, such as pelvic exam, transvaginal ultrasound and the CA125 blood test are not too effective. Risk factors are: family history of breast, ovarian, uterine and or colon cancers, no children, never having used birth control pills, and of course, getting older. See your doctor if symptoms persist for more than three weeks and ask to be referred to a gynecological oncologist. The Walk for Ovarian Cancer funds are used for research for a screening test.

Communications Chairperson Cecile Miller reported that the CWL will take responsibility for the “Pornography No More Campaign” since CASE has disbanded. Post Cards will be in the fall issue of Canadian League for us to send to our MPs. In October we are encouraged to wear the white ribbon. Also, in the fall issue, each province will be designated a month to send cards, emails and letters to MPs. Keep our eyes open for the new CWL website. CWL is also on Facebook.

Resolutions Chairperson Shari Guinta told us that letters sent from us to our MPs and MPP’s do influence them and their decisions.

Legislation Chairperson Anne Marie Gorman invited us to read and become informed about our government.

Resolutions passed were:

1. That the national council of The Catholic Women’s League of Canada, in 93rd annual national convention assembled, urge the current national executive to:

- Build relationships with indigenous women leaders
- Identify ideas and programs for members through the national standing committees on building relationships and partnerships with the indigenous peoples of Canada, and
- Encourage all members to reach out to indigenous peoples to learn more about each other and to find common ground

2. That the National Council of The Catholic Women’s League of Canada, in 93rd annual national convention assembled, urge the federal government to:

- Provide employment insurance sickness benefits up to 52 weeks for cancer patients, and
- Increase the employment insurance compassionate care benefit to 26 weeks, accessible during a 52-week period, for caregivers of cancer patients

It was also passed that a letter be written to MPs regarding female genocide because of the

occurrences of sex selection abortions using ultrasounds.

The vote was held concerning the amendments to our Bylaws and Constitution. All amendments passed.

Past-President Velma Harasen spoke about the Shepherd's Field Hospital in the Holy Land outside of Bethlehem and the Infant Welfare School in Old Jerusalem. It was passed in a vote that we would continue contributions to these projects through a Voluntary Fund until the end of December 2016.

Maribeth Stewart brought greetings from the World Union of Catholic Women's Organization (WUCWO). It is the first Catholic Women's organization recognized by the UN.

We then headed back to Holy Rosary Cathedral to celebrate the Mass of Reaffirmation of the Executive and the Installation of the new National Spiritual Advisor, Bishop Bill McGratton, who some of you may know. The gala Banquet was delicious followed by a visit from Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth who had everyone dissolving into gales of laughter during the skit.

Thursday saw us returning home to our own beds.

All in all, a wonderful convention.

Exhaustion Sets in as your Diocesan Council comes to Convention!

Ever wonder why the Diocesan Council looks so tired, or maybe doesn't smile as much as you would like???? Well, let me walk you through the years, weeks, days and hours leading up to the convention... I think you would be tired as well!

Two years before the convention: Themes are being worked on, speakers are being sought, facilities are being confirmed.

6 bi-monthly meetings, Fall Regional Meetings, other workshops are attended, reports are written, information is gathered.

One year before the convention: Speakers are confirmed, agenda is confirmed, facilities are booked, convention package is being prepared. 3 bi-monthly meetings have taken place along with the regular duties of the councils, the members happily attend many anniversaries, dinners, workshops within and without the Diocese. Reports are written and submitted. League Lingo articles are written. Summer vacation is upon us! Research on theme activities are on-going. Research on resolutions is on-going.

Fall Regional meetings take place along with the September bi-monthly meeting

6 months before the convention: Year-end reports are being gathered from the 99 councils in London Diocese. Each report must be read, and outstanding points of interest, merits, awards, and more must be

gleaned and transferred to a summary report. The media is sent a news alert about the upcoming convention and how to contact the League.

November bi-monthly meeting has taken place, agenda is confirmed, and the convention planning is in high gear. The minutes of the last convention, finance meeting and pre-convention meeting are distributed. The minutes of the last convention are distributed to every council as well. The Diocesan Council registers for the convention and chooses their meals for the time not spent in convention.

Many invitations to Christmas teas, bazaars, dinners, workshops and are gladly attended.

Merry Christmas!

4 months before the convention: Summary Report is required for submission to the President-Elect for the Report Book. Time to think about a display for the display room. The report book is put together by the President-Elect and several members edit it for errors (sorry, we do miss some!). Another media alert is sent out (there are approximately 30 media outlets to send to).

3 months before the convention: Final numbers and reports are due to Provincial Council for their annual report. Oral reports must be written and approved, presentations must be honed.

Another bi-monthly meeting takes

place...these are the regular meetings of the council where the business is taken care of.

2 months before the convention: the crunch is on! The t's are being crossed, the I's are being dotted! Pamphlets, hand-outs, assignments to "who does what" at the convention are being given out, verbal reports are enhanced, information on the speakers is being investigated, introductions and welcomes are being written. The Spiritual programme has taken shape and the Spiritual Development Chairperson works with the convention committee, communications, Spiritual Advisor and the President to finalize the plans for all spiritual programs. The report book, and all convention booklets are sent to the printer. The convention committee is in full action...the London Diocesan Council slows down for a minute! Powerpoints/slides are being prepared. Permission is sought to use music and publish the words to hymns. Media is again contacted.

1 month before the convention: the speakers and presenters are contacted to ensure the travel is appropriate. Oral reports are gone over, presentations tweaked. Media is contacted to interview with the President, and take pictures / footage at the convention.

3 weeks before the convention: the gathering of items to bring to the convention starts. Each member

Don't touch! pile at home. This is our must haves for the convention... written reports, oral reports, presentations, pamphlets, introductions, welcomes, thank you's, and more...gifts are bought, cards are written, hospitality is at the forefront.

2 weeks before the convention: now is the time to ensure everything is going smoothly. Hiccups are dealt with, changes made if necessary which in turn create a domino effect for the whole convention.

1 week before the convention: the final presentations are completed, the packing begins! Double checking to ensure everything is ready. Media interviews are confirmed.

3 days before the convention: final check is being made that all the information is available for the presentations, pamphlets have been gathered for distribution, reports are ready to go, the final changes to powerpoints/slides are being done. Travel arrangements are being confirmed, shopping for our snacks and refreshments happens.

2 days before the convention: One more final check!

1 day before the convention: Pack your clothes, pack up the cars, get ready to rumble! Check again that you have everything...including your toothbrush!

The Monday of the convention: most of the council leaves home in the early hours of the morning. They arrive at the convention center. Unload the cars, start setting up the rooms. Presentations are set up in the display rooms, resolutions are ready for distribution, financial reports are ready to go. It's 11:30 a.m. already! Hopefully the hotel allows the committee to check in at this time...if not, it's done on the run later. 12 noon the finance committee meets and goes over the finance statements and budget with a fine tooth comb. *"Breaking the Silence—A Community Workshop on Human Trafficking"
Chatham Kent Coalition Against Human Trafficking—March 20th, 2013*

I was very pleased to have the opportunity to attend the workshop sponsored by the Chatham Kent Coalition Against Human Trafficking, this week. This was a huge awareness, educational and enlightening experience for me as I learnt so much more about the dreadful scourge of Human Trafficking that is taking place right under our noses here in Southwestern Ontario. Yes, Human Trafficking is happening here in our neighbourhoods as well as in many different parts of Ontario, Canada and the world.

Marty Van Doren, the RCMP Human Trafficking Awareness Coordinator for Ontario gave us a great introduction to all aspects of Human Trafficking, which is happening everyday throughout Ontario, often described as Modern-Day Slavery!

Human Trafficking involves the recruitment, transportation and/or harbouring of persons for the purpose of exploitation, typically for sexual exploitation or forced labour. Traffickers maintain control over their victims through the use of force, fraud, deception or threats of violence to the victim or someone known to them. It is difficult to ascertain the numbers involved as victims at any one time – the present worldwide estimate is 27 million people - 80% of which are girls and women.

Victims of Human Trafficking can be found in commercial sex or prostitution, domestic care giving, farming, hotel and tourism

industries, construction, fisheries, sweatshop factories, restaurant services. Child victims of trafficking are often exploited for sexual purposes, including prostitution, pornography and sex tourism.

Human traffickers recognize and seek out the most vulnerable people in our communities and target them with very sophisticated ways and means. And according to Police they are very good at what they do.

In Canada and Ontario many victims are aboriginal girls and women and young females from urban areas. They are generally recruited for the very lucrative sex trade run by the Pimps operating in the bars, strip bars and on the streets of our towns and cities. These men befriend lonely girls either in the bars, shopping malls or as they come off the bus from remote communities, then they provide the girls with shelter, friendship, support and 'love'. Once they have gained the girl's trust through mind games they force the girls to earn money through prostitution and strip bars. Another disgusting fact I learnt is that a pimp can have many girls in his 'stable' who can earn him upward of \$500,000 per year, depending on how many girls he has.

The most effective part of the workshop for me was the amazing personal testimonies given by two women survivors of human trafficking right here in south western Ontario.

The first told us how she met her 'boyfriend' John, when she was an

adult, 36 years old! At that time she had some savings and owned a condo but had recently lost her husband, her mother and two best friends and she was lonely, sad and very vulnerable. She began to love and trust him, but gradually she lost all her savings, her condo and was then forced by her boyfriend into the sex trade as a way to earn money. She worked in Woodstock, Toronto, Sarnia and Kitchener and ended up using drugs, alcohol and prostitution, was physically, sexually and mentally abused and became suicidal when she realized she was trapped. Eventually the police were involved and she identified to them that she would like to escape from her boyfriend and way of life. She received help from the Salvation Army, got housing and received counselling during the last 3 1/2 years of her long hard journey of recovery as a survivor of human trafficking. She now says she is a victor and not a victim of Human Trafficking and is still recovering from the ordeal.

The second woman was a University of Western Ontario student, 18 years old, at the university who ran up a large visa debt in her first year in London and needed money to pay off her debts and her tuition. She found a job in a strip club selling shots/drinks – a good job that paid well so she thought at the time and she continued with her studies to become a doctor. She met a boyfriend at the club whom she trusted and loved, She was laid off in the London club so as they

needed money they moved to Windsor because they heard there was work in the strip joints. She thought she would take a semester off from London, make lots of money and return to school eventually. Her plan was to continue as a waiter in Windsor but eventually her boyfriend, who was actually a pimp, persuaded her to earn more money by becoming a stripper and eventually forced her into prostitution and drugs in Windsor. She had a child by this man, who was now sexually and physically abusive to her. She had lost almost all contact with her family but her younger brother managed to help her escape from this man by persuading her to contact the local police. She is now a human trafficking survivor who is telling her story to educate members of our communities that Human Trafficking is happening in our communities and cities throughout Ontario.

We must open our eyes to the Human Trafficking that can occur in our communities :-

- o We must become aware of the issues of human trafficking
- o Help our family and friends to become aware of the issues
- o Raise awareness levels through our community organizations
- o Do not buy goods made in sweatshops e.g. ‘Knock off’ items of merchandise are made using forced child labour or human slavery.
- o Learn safe ways to report and identify suspected cases
- o Lobby politicians for tougher laws to protect victims and to prosecute the traffickers, the pimps, johns etc.
- o Donate money to local organizations that support trafficked victims

o Join or support a local anti-trafficking group such as- the London Anti-human Trafficking Committee, The Chatham-Kent Coalition Against Human Trafficking, Men Against Sexual Trafficking, Windsor-Essex Anti-Human Trafficking Group



started to be a staunch defender of our Faith.


Although my husband and I live in Clinton I am the current President of the Kingsbridge Council (our Church—St. Joseph's, was closed in October 2013, but our council remains intact). I had attended Mass at St. Anne's Chapel (which has now been discontinued) which leaves me attending service at St. Peter's, Goderich. These closures have let me view first hand the backlash of such happenings. These things have reinforced my belief that the League is a very valuable source of community and

a way to provide comradeship to our fellow sisters. This past summer I ventured to the Retreat at Merlin. What a wonderful place for prayer and reflection and comradeship.

so get your members and parishioners out to enjoy the presentation. Maybe your parish will be the lucky winners this time.


Although I was unable to attend the Day at the Shrine, I understand it was a beautiful day and was enjoyed by those in attendance.

much from my councils...so all is well! I was fortunate enough to run into some CWL ladies throughout the summer, it is always nice to see a familiar face.


Membership time will soon approach, so get thinking about your strategy for collecting dues. And always be on the lookout for





First of all, thank you to all who attended the Convention in Stratford. It was so delightful to meet you at the Registration Table. We enjoyed talking with all who attended. We were also pleased that one of our own members received the **CWL Social Justice Award**. The following is Elisabeth Dobbe's moving acceptance speech:

With gratitude, I will accept this award in memory of my husband, Nate, and our sons, William and Albert. I also wish to give a special thank you to the ladies who nominated me for this honour. It was some kind of shock to me when I received a letter in the mail telling me

that I was to receive this award, especially when Mary Jean asked me to share with you about what I do and why. My first thought was "Dear Lord, You put me through so much already, what do You want me to say now?" But the story that I will share with you has to be centred around this question, "Why did Nate and I devote our entire married life to looking after our two handicapped sons and then other volunteer service work?" What do we really mean when we talk about social justice? When the Lord said, "Whatsoever you do to the least of My brothers, you do unto Me", we can take this in many different ways. With this in mind, I will tell you a little bit about what and why Nate and I did everything together. When Nate and I got married, we started out like every

other young couple, but when we said "for better or worse", we really did mean it. We both wanted at least six or seven children. So often we hear people say, tell God what you have in mind, but He smiles and says, "That is what you think." In our situation, that became our reality. God had other plans for us. He blessed us with two beautiful healthy sons. When William and Albert reached six months of age they each received immunization shots. Something went terribly wrong. Both of them became completely disabled. For some unknown reason, and only by the Grace of God, Nate and I were able to accept what happened to our sons, without blaming anyone,

or asking God why this had to happen to us. We just took care of our boys and loved them. Albert died when he was almost 26 and William was 33 when he died. Against all the expectations of the medical field, both of our boys lived much longer than it was thought possible. After William died, we were lost for a while. But not even two months later, Marge Skinner gave us some material from Dr. Andrew Simone of Canadian Food for Children, which was dropped off at Immaculate Conception Church. They needed someone in the Stratford area to set up a collection and sorting depot and then send it all to Toronto. As we still had the van which we had used for the boys all those years, we decided to get involved, in memory of William and Albert. We already were supporting Bishop Priamo Tejada Missions in the Dominican Republic. We had met Bishop Priamo in Stratford while he was visiting Fr. Bourque. Several times we visited him in the Dominican. He took us all over the place, he did not hide anything. We visited the leprosy hospital and the bathey, etc. What we saw was

suffering, so much cold, hard suffering. One day, Nate asked him how he was able to keep on going with so much suffering of his people and he smiled and said to Nate, "How were you able to keep going all those years with the suffering of your boys? Is it not by the Grace of God that we keep on going?" One night when I came from Marge's place, after we had gathered all the information, it was late when I went home. Something very interesting happened. A car came with such a speed through the red stoplight, that if I had been just a few seconds earlier, I would not be here today. My first thought was, "Okay, Lord, You don't have to be that drastic, I got Your message." When Nate and I started helping Canadian Food for Children, it was just the two of us working out of our house. Soon, God blessed us with more people that wanted to help. We all had fun working and spending time together. Altogether, we did this for fourteen years, until 2008. By then, Nate was no longer able to drive to Toronto. We had taken more than 350 loads to Toronto and I had never washed so many pails in my life; more than 35,000, and rolled milk bags and

plastic bags. Since we believed so strongly in the right to life from conception to natural death, we became greatly involved with the Right to Life in Stratford. Just after, I was voted in as President of the Stratford & District Right to Life in 2009. Nate died in 2010. Today, I spend most of my time doing Right to Life work, which is never ending and very far reaching. Again, there is so much suffering and so much damage. God has blessed us with a sincere group of people as executives for the group, who want to work together for the sanctity of life. There is always lots of work to do. When God gives us life, He does not let us see what is going to happen throughout that life. He does not ask us to be perfect, as only He is perfect. He does not ask us to do impossible tasks, but He does give us a task. The task is to love, not counting the cost, and not asking, "Why me, Lord," but rather, pick up the cross every day and say, "Thy will be done."



In the past few years, some of our Life Members have passed away. Following the untimely death of Life Member, Helene Regier, the Diocesan Executive felt we should have some way to recognize the work done by our Life Members and Diocesan Past Presidents. As many of these ladies were involved in or had great concern for social justice issues, it was felt that the most appropriate way we could recognize them would be through the establishment of a Social Justice Award.

The London Diocesan Council of the Catholic Women's League of Canada has established a Social Justice Award to be awarded annually. The award is intended to recognize men or women engaged in social justice work. A person will be eligible to receive the award upon a nomination form being submitted.

Award Criteria:

1. Demonstrated involvement in social justice activities
2. Nomination by a CWL Council, a pastor or campus minister or equivalent
3. The award must be used to finance participation in a reputable social justice activity, either at home or abroad, e.g. Development and Peace, work in inner city or northern experiences
4. Priority will be given to someone who identifies with Catholic ideals
5. The committee may decide to give the yearly amount to one candidate or divide it among several nominees
6. Successful nominees will be asked to share their experience with League members
7. Decision of the committee is final

With this award –

- We hope to raise awareness of social justice
- To build solidarity and community to those in need
- To hold as our highest priority, the teachings of the gospels through our concern for the common good and dignity of all human persons
- To bring to light issues around the world and call the world to action on behalf of those who lack this basic human right.
