



London Diocesan Council Report 2022

As we felt it was still not prudent to meet in person we held our Annual Lenten retreat online with 147 women attending. Our topic was Mary, the Blessed Virgin.

It was a difficult decision but to be on the safe side we held our AMM online. It was decided that the executive would all be present but everyone else would be online. As such there were no speakers present. We were able to have our prayers and reports online. Shari Guinta represented National and Colleen Perry Provincial, and gave their talk through Zoom. Our social justice award winner was Yvonne Triesman for her work volunteering and arranging medical help, doctors, nurses and medical supplies in Guyana.

Our councils were getting familiar with zoom meetings so a very successful fun night was held on zoom. The theme was "pretty in pink" and members were encouraged to wear pink and join in the fun from the safety of their home. Jokes, exercises, videos, painting and music were all part of the fun. A legislation workshop was held online using Betty Colaneri's workshop with some changes made. It was very well received and many questions were asked. We followed up later in the year with a resolution workshop that was held in person but then later repeated online for those who couldn't attend in person.

Our diocese was highlighted in the provincial newsletter in June and many articles and pictures were sent in.

Every June there is a retreat at Holy Family Retreat House in Oxley, for the diocesan executive and the Life members. Fr. Murray Sample spoke on Faith, Service and Social Justice.

July saw a return to our annual day at the diocesan shrine to our Lady in Merlin Ontario. There were around 175 women from across the diocese and several spiritual advisors. It was a wonderful day and the rain held off until it was over.

We held three regional days that were well attended and where the three pillars were explained. There were also workshops on the importance of

membership growth, explaining the importance of raising the per capita and a nominations and election workshop.

After a break of a few years, a diocesan newsletter was started again to be published three times a year, by our Administrative Assistant Julie Sans. It is a resounding success.

A lot of our councils have struggled through the pandemic and are hoping for a better future where more women will come forward to share their talent.







The Center hoped to purchase and donate 5,000 Life Straws for the people of Ukraine who are challenged by water insecurity. Our council collected \$700 and were able to deliver 56 personal water filtration units to the Ukrainian Center. These Life Straws filter out 99.99% of particles including bacteria, parasites, and microplastics allowing them to drink from any water source – rivers, ponds and puddles and can be used up to 100 times.

At one of our general meetings, it was brought to our attention that some funeral homes were offering rooms for euthanasia. One of our members decided to investigate this further. She contacted ten funeral homes in London and asked if they participate in offering a room for M.A.I.D. It was discovered that there were two, A. Millard George Funeral Home and Northview Funeral Chapel. They do not use the term "M.A.I.D. Rooms" but instead refer to them as the "Compassion Room". We were very disappointed to learn about this and shared the information with our members.
