




"Behold the handmaid of the Lord; let it be done to me according to your word."



Diocesan Marian Pilgrimage

Plan Your Summer visit to the Shrine of Our Lady of the Rosary in Merlin FEAST OF THE ASSUMPTION of the Blessed Virgin Mary - Wednesday, August 15 Bishop Fabbro will celebrate Mass at 11 am | lunch | Rosary Procession Divine Mercy Chaplet | Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament at 2:15 pm

Prior to the Mass, the Sacrament of Reconciliation will be offered. Parishes are invited to organize a pilgrimage to this celebration. The faithful can also join a *Walking Pilgrimage* to the Shrine. There will be two starting points for the pilgrimage; a 10 KM walk will depart from the North Buxton Museum at 8:00 a.m., and a 5 KM walk will depart from the Merlin Community Hall at 9:00 a.m. Parishes are encouraged to organize a carpool or bus of pilgrims and join one of the two departure locations. Pilgrims arriving by car will be able to park their vehicles at these locations, and volunteers will be available after the day's celebrations to drive pilgrims back to the parking lots. A diocesan representative will be at each of the two departure locations and will lead pilgrims to the Shrine.



Spiritual Corner

"Humility is the mother of all virtues: purity, charity and obedience. It is in being humble that our love becomes real, devoted and ardent. If you are humble nothing will touch you, neither praise nor disgrace, because you know what you are. If you are blamed you will not be discouraged. If they call you a saint you will not put yourself on a pedestal." says, Blessed Teresa of Calcutta. The Bible describes humility as meekness, lowliness, and absence of self. The Greek word translated "humility" in Col 3:12 and elsewhere literally means "lowliness of mind," so we see that humility is a heart attitude, not merely an outward behavior. One may put on an outward show of humility but still have a heart full of pride and arrogance. When we come to Christ as sinners, we must come in humility. We acknowledge that we are the poor who come with nothing to offer Him but our sin and our need for salvation. We recognize our lack of merit and our complete inability to save ourselves. Then when He offers the grace and mercy of God, we accept it in humble gratitude and commit our lives to Him. We "die to self" so that we can live as new creations in Christ (2 Cor 5:17). We never forget that He has exchanged our worthlessness for His infinite worth, our sin for His righteousness, and the life we now live we live by faith in the Son of God, who loved us and gave Himself for us (Gal 2:20).

Humility is not only necessary to enter the kingdom, it is also necessary to be great in the kingdom (Mat 20:26-27). Jesus is our model. He did not come to be served, but to serve, so we must commit ourselves to serving others. We are warned that when we are vain or seek riches God is displeased with us. God has promised to give grace to the humble, while He opposes the proud (Proverbs 3:34; 1 Peter 5:5). Therefore, we must confess and put away pride. If we exalt ourselves, we place ourselves in opposition to God who will, in His grace and for our own good, humble us. But if we humble ourselves, God gives us more grace and exalts us (Luke 14:11). Therefore let us all pray for humility to the Lamb of God, who, both by your example and precept, instructed us to be meek and humble, ask to give us grace throughout our whole life, in every thought, and word, and work, to imitate His meekness and humility. Let us ask Him to mortify in us the whole body of pride, grant us to feel that we are nothing and have nothing, claim nothing, we deserve nothing but shame and contempt, but misery and punishment. Further we may too plea to Grant us His graces that we will not seek our own glory, but looking wholly unto Him and acting wholly for Him.
