President's Message

Mary's Musings and Meaning

Winter has brought us: its fresh coldness; its sparkling white snow; and its quiet stillness; a time of reflection as spring draws near about who we are as Catholic Women's League members and how God's love calls us to respond to His call with, "Here I am, Lord; send me". So how do we answer in Faith, Service and Social Justice?

We have had a lot of questions about how to use these three pillars without being overwhelmed. Actually, there are ways to weave the three together. First take a look in your community and find a need. Some ideas are: Homelessness, loneliness, food insecurity, newcomers from another country, our environment, human trafficking, long-term care homes, pro-life issues and many more!

We are praying communities so, first of all, we pray for those who are trapped by the issue we are interested in. Perhaps it is those who have no home. Prayer is our first and primary source-the Faith pillar. As a service, do we perhaps send food that is left over from our functions to a homeless shelter? Do we make sandwiches for those who may be volunteering for Habitat for Humanity, building a shelter for a family at low rates? That's the Service pillar. For Social Justice for the unhoused in your own community, contact your councillors on town council and your mayor to urge them to take action, perhaps providing housing that is geared to income in Truth. As you can see you do not have to have a chair for each of the pillars. I know how hard it is to just find a president. But I also know that there are many members who are eager to help. For loneliness during COVID there were so many ways you prayed for those shut in, phoned them, and sent cards showing your concern that they not get extremely depressed. And you still continue to do this, only now with in-person visits. Have you thought about how you can encourage your communities to have low-cost services for the lonely or shut-ins to access? Each of those pillars forms a tripod to hold up the CWL and their communities so that we may answer God's call with a whole-hearted "Here I am, Lord; send me." We really need to listen to God and others. Pope Francis says, "Obeying God is listening to God, having an open heart to follow the path God sets out for us."

Indigenous Blanket Exercise



As part of the provincial *BEE Compassion Into Action* project, our St. Joseph Council in Corunna ON chose to act on the topic of Truth and Reconciliation. We hosted an *Indigenous Blanket Exercise* at our Parish Centre in September, 2023. The Blanket Exercise is based on using Indigenous methodologies and the goal is to build understanding about our shared history as Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples in Canada by walking through the stages of pre-contact, treaty-making, colonization and resistance.

All members of the parish were invited to attend through announcements in the bulletin. There was a limit of 30 participants for the Exercise.

The evening was facilitated by Cortnee Goure, Coordinator with the St. Clair Catholic District School Board and Steve Tooshkenig of the Walpole Island First Nation. Participants played the role our First Nations, Metis, and Inuit People on Turtle Island as they were led through a series of historical events that impacted these peoples as European settlers arrived. Each person stood on a blanket as they played out their part.

At the end we gathered in a circle and were invited to share our thoughts and feelings. Feedback was positive with many feeling they were better informed and were moved by the activity. The evening concluded with refreshments and fellowship.

The girls had their own table where they sold their crafts and items that were donated to them. When they were not needed at their own table, the girls were happy to help in whatever capacity was needed.

Very proud of these girls.



Crocheting Chemo Caps: An Act of Service

Several Catholic Women's League councils from Ingersoll region joined forces to crochet/knit close to 200 beanies and caps for the Woodstock Hospital Chemotherapy Clinic. CWL members and parishioners from Holy Trinity, Woodstock, Our Lady Queen of Martyrs, Delhi, St, Mary's, Tillsonburg, St. Bernard, Waterford, Sacred Heart, Ingersoll and St. Cecilia's, Port Dover have been working on this project for over a year. The beanies and caps were blessed on Sept 23, 2023 by Father Sebastian and then presented to Woodstock Hospital Chemotherapy Clinic on Oct 2, 2023. These caps/beanies will bring comfort to those undergoing chemotherapy treatment in Oxford and Norfolk County.

Our regional chairpersons play an important role in the structure of the London Diocesan Council. They are the voice of all the councils they represent in their area. The regional chairpersons are appointed by the diocesan president for a two-year term. This appointment can be renewed once. They should be a past parish council president.

The regional chair is a voting member of the executive council which meets five times a year. As the liaison for her councils, she provides information to the diocesan council about her region and provides her region with information from the executive council. She chairs her region's meetings five times a year, passes on directives, reminds councils of annual reports and on-line surveys and assists with parish council questions. An annual report is submitted and she attends the diocesan convention as an accredited delegate.

Thank you, Jeanne, for your dedication to the League.




We welcome Carol Hall as the new regional chair for the Sarnia-Lambton region.
